I'm going to do something here that I haven't done in at least a year: I'm going to write a newsletter article that has *nothing* to do with the pandemic! (You're welcome.)

This past Sunday during coffee hour, I shared a story from my family history with some folks, and someone said: "Now, why haven't you shared *that* story in a sermon?!?" I will share it here instead.

In April of this year, my father came to visit and brought with him a few things of special value to him that he wanted to pass on to his grandson, my son Owen. He brought a rudimentary wooden toolbox that his grandfather had built for him when he was Owen's age. He also brought a three-ring binder with some pictures and narratives from the life of my great-grandfather.

Included among these narratives is a story that has become legend in our family. My great-grandfather had immigrated from Sweden and was working his way across Canada on the railroad. I share the story with you here in my great-grandfather's own words.

"My Closest Shave"

On August 4, 1898, I was working with a bridge crew at Glacier, B.C. in Canada. We had cleared the bridge to let the express pass over. The foreman noticed some tools and ropes that were left on the rails and I was ordered to clear the obstruction.

As I reached the center of the bridge, I saw a train approaching at high speed at the snow shed at the end of the bridge with only two feet of space outside the rail! Should I jump fifty feet into the icy Illicillewaet River, which was full of big boulders?

In a flash I remembered a dream months previous and how I had acted in the dream under similar circumstances. Down I went, flat on the narrow space between the rails. In the next split second, the locomotive cylinder brushed over my head.

Our men stood aghast at the end of the bridge, expecting to pick up remnants of a dead Swede. The engineer was at the point of collapse as the train came to a stop. The only casualty that day was my straw hat, which went down the stream.

A dream as God's messenger had saved my life!

What has always captivated me about this story is that it is as if my life, too, was spared on that bridge more than a century ago. He had no idea what could have been lost to history in that frightening moment. In the same way, we have no idea what richness is lost to this world with every life that ends prematurely—generations of family, cherished friendships, fruitful work, impactful investment in the lives of others, and so on.

Part of what makes every life precious is that life begets life—not only literally in the sense of progeny, but also figuratively in the many impossible-to-trace ways that a single life impacts the lives of others and quite literally changes the course of history. This is what my great-grandfather's "closest shave" taught me.

LaPratt Family Update

In early August, we made a difficult and abrupt decision to move to Switzerland for one year. At the time, we had no idea if this would be a foolish choice or a wise one. We may be wondering for years to come which it was. But we are fortunate to have had this option as we are all dual US/Swiss Citizens. Although many imagine Switzerland to be a land of picturesque utopia landscaped by chocolate mountains, fondue waterfalls and Rolex islands, for us, it was simply a place of relative Covid-free refuge with schools that have been consistently open with minimal sign of Covid restrictions. Our girls have solidified their mother's native Swiss German language and can also fairly comfortably communicate with strangers in "normal" German- for this skill alone, I'll be forever grateful. But for Sylvia and me, the year seems to have been filled with a constant search of where to maintain income enough to sustain our one-year "experiment". It's not cheap to live here. e.g. This past Sunday, I filled up our minivan gas tank for \$144.08. And that was the cheap gas station. And we weren't quite yet on Empty. Although we knew that it would be

an expensive year, we had (literally) counted on Sylvia's Michigan employer to follow through on their commitment to allow her to keep her full-time job (and income/insurance) while working remotely from Switzerland all year. They changed their mind four weeks after we'd moved here. Keeping in mind the proverb necessity is the mother of invention, we have been grateful to have found the following supplementary employment and income this year: Chinese food delivery, golf/country club dishwasher, pharmacy medicine sorter, hemp hanger, department store sales clerk, substitute teacher, post office worker, immigrant farm laborer, courier, and doping control officer. Yes, we've gone skiing in the Alps and visited castles and have eaten lots of cheese and chocolate. But we've also been spoiled by Babcia and Opa and Tante Carmen living nearby! We're hoping to conclude our year here with a roadtrip to see the Eiffel Tower- spending our gas-fillup and grocery credit card points on hotels. We are excited to return to our "regular" Michigan life soon by the end of July. And, like many of you, we look forward to seeing and hugging our MPC friends again.

Get Involved

Everyone Eats

The Presbytery of Detroit Everyone Eats (E1E) workgroup consists of representatives from Faith Community Church in Novi, First Presbyterian Church of Northville, Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, South Lyon Presbyterian Church, Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church of Detroit, and Milford Presbyterian Church. The workgroup has been meeting via ZOOM every 4-6 weeks since March 2020. The workgroup was notified in March 2020 that Trinity Episcopal Church would be permanently closed at the end of June 2020. The workgroup looked for other program possibilities for E1E in the midst of the pandemic.

During the summer and fall of 2020 the workgroup contributed monies normally spent on food to 3-4 other food distribution programs: Novi Emergency Food Bank, Northville Civic Concerns, Fort Street Presbyterian's "Open Door," and New Bethel AME Church. Mary Howard, who served clients of E1E in many ways above and beyond E1E lunches at Spirit of Hope continued to distribute food to clients using the sidewalk outside the church during the fall months of 2020. She was then able to move to the New Bethel AME Church to distribute food.

The E1E Workgroup provided some food, funds, and volunteers to help distribute food at four Parking Lot Food Ministries during the fall of 2020 and winter of 2021. This will continue through this spring and summer. These Detroit ministries include St John's Presbyterian Church's "Unpack the Truck" (3rd Friday of the month); New Bethel AME Episcopal Church, which provides boxes of food every Wednesday; Calvary Presbyterian Church, providing boxes of food every 3rd Saturday of the month; and Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church's "Free Food on Fridays."

Your contributions to the MPC Hunger Ministry Offering each October help MPC provide food, funds, paper products etc. to these ministries.

Fugitive, Lover, & Nudist

What Founding Father can claim these titles? Give up? Benjamin Franklin.

Ben was born in Boston in 1735. At the age of 12 he became an apprentice for his brother James in his printing company called the New England Courant.

Ben wanted to write articles but James said “No way.”

So “clever “ Ben penned a column under a secret pseudonym entitled “The Silent Dogwood Column.” Mrs. Dogwood (Ben) would write about fashion, marriage, and religion. Things were going great until eligible bachelors wanted to propose to her. Ben had to fess up and James was furious. James was well known for smacking Ben around and this time was no exception.

Ben had enough and fled to Philadelphia, but his troubles were not over.

By law, Ben had signed a contract to work for many years at the printing press. He could be imprisoned or hung for breaking this signed document. But as luck would have it, it never happened.

Fast Forward in History

Ben Franklin began his life-long accomplishments as he became an inventor and developed many historic items. His favorite was the armonica, an instrument which created beautiful sounds with the touch of a finger. This one gave him the most personal satisfaction.

Ben belonged to sex clubs and when he started his own newspaper called the Pennsylvania Gazette, he wrote sex and gossip columns. Way before Dear Abbey.

His sex drive, they say, helped win the American Revolution. He persuaded French ladies to convince their men to send troops to help Washington win the war from the Brits. Thanks Ben for taking one for the colonies!!

Ben would take “air baths” and sunbath nude thinking fresh air prevented sicknesses.

Ben was married to Deborah Read from 1730-1774 until her death. They had three children, William, Sarah and Francis.

Ben was the only person to sign all four documents that help create the United States: the Declaration of Independence in 1776, the treaty with France in 1778, the peace treaty between England, the United States, and France in 1782, and the United States Constitution in 1787.

He spoke five languages, and established both the University of Pennsylvania and the first public Pennsylvania hospital. His face is on the one hundred dollar bill.

Benjamin Franklin died from a infection of the lung in 1790. 20,000 attended his funeral. He was buried in Christ Church Burial Ground in Philadelphia.

At its stated meeting on Tuesday, April 20, 2021, the session took the following actions:

- approved the budget for April 1, 2021—March 31, 2022
- reviewed the slate of candidates for the Class of 2024: Session—David Baldwin, Kelly Holloway, Betsy Phillips, Lee Vandebussche, and Greg Wahowiak; Board of Deacons - Amber Innis, Suzanne Jarasz and Mary McFarland.

At its stated meeting on Tuesday, May 18, 2021, the session took the following actions:

- total membership as of May 18 is 445
- approved an expenditure not exceeding \$5,000 for refinishing and repair of the MPC front doors
- approved a pre-recorded worship service and an outdoor worship service at the Milford Fairgrounds Park at 10:00 am for Sunday, August 15 (Milford Memories)
- approved the elimination of the reservation system, assigned seating in the pews and seating capacity limits for in-person worship services effective Sunday, May 23
- in deference to recent Michigan DHHS COVID-19 rulings, approved the elimination of mask requirements for fully vaccinated participants at in-person worship services effective Sunday, May 23. Masking requirements will remain for participants at in-person worship services who are not fully vaccinated
- approved the dates of Sunday, May 23 and Sunday, June 13 for the ordination/installation of elders and deacons for the Classes of 2023 and 2024
- approved permission for Isaac Chung, former Pastor of White Lake Presbyterian Church and guest pastor at MPC to solicit financial support for overseas mission work during the MPC worship service of Sunday, August 8.

The next stated Session meeting is Tuesday, June 15 at 7:00 pm.


